What we found useful in the support kit

- Throughout the support kit is a focus on the people, not the addiction.
 - Action 1's videos
 - Action 4's decentering stigma
- Inventorying what you know, what you have, what you need (Actions 2 and 3)

This crisis is about people, first and foremost.

Action 1: Getting to Why



Consider hiring a social worker or community engagement specialist.

We share our CES with Coos Bay Public Library.

The position is grant-funded and supplied by a local behavioral health agency.

A CES can assist patrons with needs the library staffer often cannot, such as housing needs, counseling, job applications, and finding addiction recovery services.

An added bonus: Their networks will include people and services you may not be aware of.







Free Naloxone Training at the North Bend Public Library

Monday, May 13 from 4:00-6:00 PM There are 4 sessions every half hour with the last session starting at 5:30 PM







A free training on how to use naloxone, an opioid overdose reversal medicine.

One FREE nasal naloxone kit will be available to each attendee!

It's easy to focus on the addiction

- There are options for pain management.



- Like many good programs, it was lightly attended by thirteen patrons.
- The audience included someone worried about a relative, and a woman who had been using opioids for years and wanted to know if she was at risk.
- You don't need a crowd when the right people show up.






